OUR GOALS

In the summer of 1995, a group of parents in Pennsylvania initiated this camp because they wanted their children educated in the Unification Principle with these three goals in mind.

- 1. To hear and understand Divine Principle from start to finish at least once a year at an age-appropriate level so that children can gradually take ownership of the Principle, using it to guide their choices in life as they grow and mature in their understanding.
- 2. To facilitate for each child a personal experience with God: to help each child make his or her own special connection to God in order to initiate or strengthen a lifelong communication with Heavenly Father.
- 3. To have each child and every family experience what it means to have a community of faith, and to give everyone a taste of living in that community of love that, in its perfection, is the Kingdom of Heaven.

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Rules for Skits

Skits are not a mandatory part of the camp experience. However, it can be a wonderful way to have campers experience team unity and joy through sharing with one another and with the audience. If your group expresses an interest in doing a skit for Talent Night, please try to work with them along the following guidelines.

- 1. All skits must relate in a supportive way to the lectures and to the overall experience of camp, and must contribute to a joyful experience for all. In other words, stay away from questionable or inappropriate subject matter. It must all be Heavenly Entertainment.

- 3. Only the most Abel-like member can play the Cain-like role. If you have someone who is not so clear, they can play God, Father, Jesus, Super Moonie, etc. The most united and clear-spirited campers can play the Devil.
- 4. Skits must be SHORT Five minutes or less in length!

Building Team Spirit and Team Unity

Unity

Our Family Camps have the same theme every year: JOY!

To really create a joyful experience, there has to be UNITY! As group leaders, you are KEY in creating the spirit of unity within your group, within your lecture group, and within the camp as a whole.
